Enabling works have been completed

It's an exciting time for the \$150 million project with enabling works now completed.

Enabling works were required to prepare the site for the new clinical services building and included the construction, demolition and relocation of a number of buildings and services that were in the existing footprint of the new acute building.

The extension to the Community Health building was completed in September 2018, increasing the building size by approximately 275 square metres.

Springfield House and Lady Grose Home were demolished and the new Asset Management Office, Workshop and Waste Shed were completed in the first half of 2019.

The new main services trench was completed and now serves as the backbone of services and infrastructure for the Goulburn Hospital campus.

Geofabric now covers the site (pictured below) to stop erosion and dust as early works are finalised ahead of main works construction which is due to begin later in 2019.

The NSW Government has committed \$2.5 million to refurbish Crookwell District Hospital.

Families across the Crookwell region will benefit from the upgrade which will deliver:

- improved emergency department with increased capacity
- improvements to the minor procedures area
- improved ward areas for inpatients throughout the hospital, including patient rooms and bathrooms
- medical equipment upgrades, including ECG machines, defibrillator and a transport ventilator
- new floor covering in the Hutton Wing
- major painting works
- improved nurse call system.

Planning on upgrades will begin this quarter.

EUROBODALLA

Eurobodalla Health Service is in the process of finalising the Clinical Services Plan (CSP) with NSW Health. Funding isn't anticipated for this financial year however the NSW Government has committed to commencing the project in this term of government.

Following finalisation of the CSP, the next steps involve master planning, and formal development and consideration of a variety of solutions that meet the clinical requirements.

The master planning process involves the development of a campus plan that will identify the key elements of a hospital, such as clinical or acute services buildings, structures housing specialist care units and ancillary or support services.

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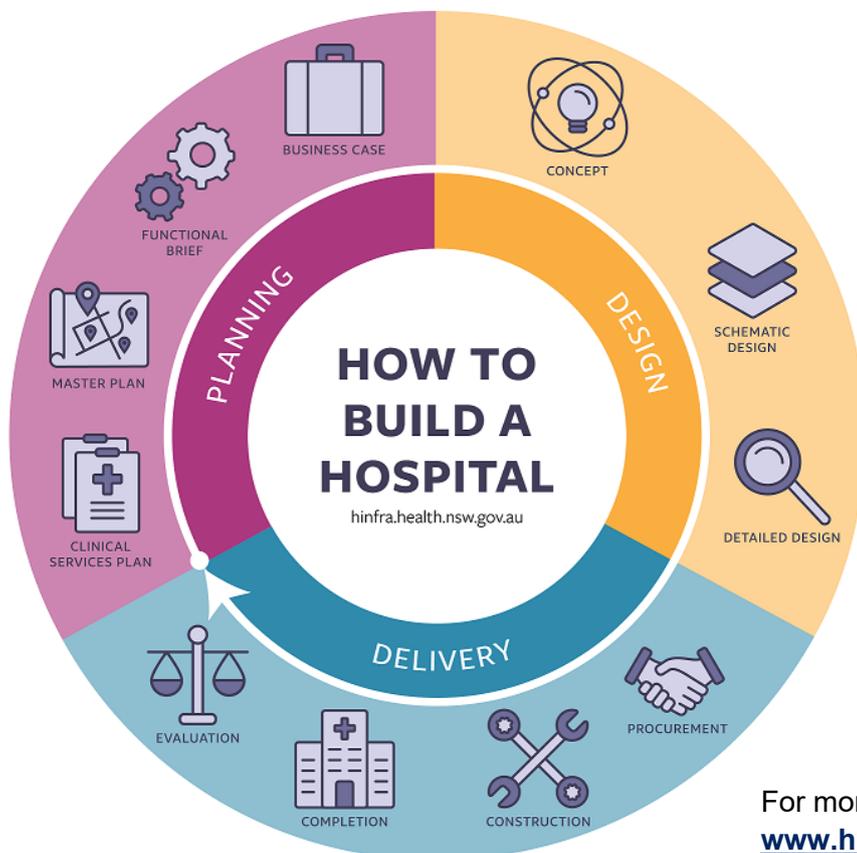
HOW TO BUILD A HOSPITAL

Redeveloping a hospital is not as straight forward as you may think – every redevelopment is tailored to a community’s unique needs. Once the Local Health District (LHD) completes the Clinical Services Plan, Health Infrastructure along with the LHD appoint a Lead Design Team to begin planning for the redevelopment. This involves creating a hospital campus master plan, which then is used to develop a concept design.

Combining information from the Clinical Services Plan, master plan and concept design, a business case is compiled which outlines the redevelopment’s scope and budget.

Only after we have conducted this extensive planning and design process can we start building. Delivery involves the award of a construction tender with the successful contractor beginning construction works which can include enabling works, early works and/or main works. As many of our redevelopments take place on existing hospital sites, it is essential that works are staged to not compromise the day to day operations of the staff and clinicians in providing patient care.

Health Infrastructure has developed a systematic approach to redeveloping hospital and health care facilities, and this is outlined in the diagram below.
